FREETOWN CHRISTIANIA

316 **THE NATURAL BEAUTY** Most people who have heard of Christiania know it as a hippie commune created back in the early 1970s. Many people know it as the centre of Copenhagen's counterculture community as well as a place where hashish, though technically illegal, is traded and consumed openly. But what a lot of people are not aware of is how lovely the area's nature is, especially the lake, the canal, and the surrounding woods.

317 **ARCHITECTURE** WITHOUT **ARCHITECTS**

Part science lab, part performance art space, ISTID was opened by two local women looking to do something new for their fellow ice-cream-obsessed Copenhageners.

Painted a vibrant shade of ice-cream pink, Østerberg is the brainchild of self-confessed 'ice-cream nerd' Cathrine Østerberg, who serves up fresh batches daily in handmade cones, minus the artificial nasties. Flavours span from the usual favourites to some truly ingenious curveballs – jackfruit sorbet, licorice, and sea buckthorn.

THE WATER

446 CHRISTIANSHAVN CANAL

Christianshavn ②

Inspired by the cities of Holland, the Danish King Christian IX built the canals of Christianshavn in the 17th century. Today, wandering along Christianshavn Canal is one of the best ways to experience Copenhagen's nautical history and modern local flavour.



447 COPENHAGEN LAKES

Østerbro, Nørrebro, Vesterbro Districts Copenhagen K ① Copenhagen's five manmade lakes stretch like a watery belt across three of the city's central districts: from cosy Østerbro in the north, through the artsy district of Nørrebro, and into the vibrant neighbourhood of Vesterbro to the south.

448 ISLANDS BRYGGE HARBOUR WALK

Southern District Christianshavn ② Crossing over the harbour from the city centre on Langebro Bridge, turn south into Islands Brygge. Moving south through Islands Brygge (Iceland's Quay), walkers will have excellent views back toward the city before arriving at the impressive Gemini Residence building.

449 THE STRANDVEJEN

Suburban District Strandvejen (8)

On sunny days, the oversized water-front sidewalk stretching between
Charlottenlund Beach Park and Bellevue
Beach will be packed with Copenhageners.
With views of busy sailboats, the historic
Skovshoved fishing village, and Sweden
on the horizon, you can see why locals are
eager to trek these four scenic kilometres,
then turn around and do it again.

450 NYHAVN TO THE LITTLE MERMAID

City Centre Copenhagen K ① Turning north from Nyhavn onto Toldbodgade/Amaliegade will start walkers on a two kilometre seafront journey that passes by some of the city's most iconic landmarks, including Amalienborg (the Queen's home), the Marble Church, the New Royal Opera House, St. Alban's Church, and ending up at *The Little Mermaid* statue.

The 5 most important RULES FOR BIKING

in Copenhagen

476 USING COPENHAGEN'S BIKE LANES

In 2015, Copenhagen officially became the most bicycle-friendly city in the world. The two most important rules for using the city's extensive network of bike lanes are (1) always stay to the right unless you are passing someone, and (2) don't do anything so suddenly that it would disrupt the flow of other cyclists and/or cause a crash.

477 USE THOSE HAND SIGNALS

To turn right, extend your right arm outward before turning, to let cyclists behind you know what you're about to do. If you're going to turn left, do the same thing and remember to look back over your left shoulder first so you don't cut someone off. If you plan to stop, then raise your left hand up for a few seconds before you stop to alert those cyclists behind you.

478 WHAT THE BELL?

All bikes in Copenhagen are required to have a small bell attached to the handle bars. This is the polite Danish way of alerting cyclists ahead that you'd like to pass them. Just lightly ring your bell, the cyclists ahead will move over to the right and allow you to pass. Once you've made your move, then move over to the right yourself and carry on enjoying the freedom of the biking life.

479 **PARKING AND LOCKING**

When you borrow, rent, or buy a bicycle in Copenhagen, make sure you learn how to lock it securely – and always lock your bike in the city, even if you're popping into a shop for two minutes. Also, look out for 'no bike parking' signs in front of some shops and make sure to pay attention when you leave your bike in a massive bike parking area, many bikes look alike.

480 LIGHTS ON

It's the law in Copenhagen that all bikes have a functioning white front light and a red back light. It is not uncommon to be stopped by the police and to have your bike checked for the proper safety lights. When cycling at night or in low light, always turn your lights on. In case you need to buy bike lights, they are inexpensive and are available in almost all grocery stores, discount shops, and kiosks.
